Parent Workshops

We invite families to view our <u>parents workshops</u> posted on our curriculum website through our YouTube Channel. We have covered a variety of topics so far this year and are always open to feedback on any additional topics that parents are interested in learning more about.

K-12 Tutoring

The middle schools continue to offer virtual evening tutoring sessions. This program has had great success and will now continue through May! Click here to learn more about it. Elementary schools have reached out to families to offer before or after-school tutoring sessions for small groups of students in areas of need. The high school is working on a similar model in which select students will be offered additional support before or after school, based on need.

RPS Summer Bridge Extension '22

The RPS Summer Bridge Extension website is open and linked to the front page of the RPS website. Registration for K-8 is complete. Parents can expect to hear from the K-8 Directors about confirmed registration by May 6. Registration is still open for current 8th through 11th graders for **High School Intensives**, as is **High School Readiness** for rising 9th graders. **High School Readiness** is a tried and true program that supports rising 9th graders as they transition into high school. Students connect with new peers; get to know teachers and the buildings; have fun and practice some skills that will support the transition.

Health and Safety

Our COVID-19 Health and Safety Committee continues to meet regularly to review RPS COVID-19 procedures. Beginning May 2, RPS will no longer be offering asymptomatic PCR screening tests in school. We have several thousand Rapid antigen home test kits available to RPS families. If you would like test kits, you can obtain them from your school nurse.

Also beginning on May 2, RPS will no longer be sending daily COVID-19 case notices via email. Cases will continue to be updated at the RPS COVID-19 tracker on a daily basis. Families will be alerted by their building principal when there has been a COVID-19 exposure in their child's classroom.

As a reminder for families, students, and staff- anyone experiencing symptoms of COVID-19 must stay home from school and contact your school nurse. When returning to school, please remember to provide either a negative COVID-19 test result or a note from your physician stating a diagnosis other than COVID-19. For home test results, please take a photo of the test with name and date taken, then send it to your school nurse.
